– to be located in the center of St. Peter's





On my face the paint's congealing.


Loins concertina'd in my gut, I drop an arse as counterweight and move without the help of eyes.

Like a skinned martyr I abut on air, and, wrinkled, show my fat. Bow-like, I strain toward the skies.


